Discussion Questions

1. What are some of the complex factors that make the Central American economy so vulnerable to *la roya*?

2. The article refers to *la roya* as "a slow-onset natural disaster" (page 2). How might the response of aid groups, governments, and individuals differ in this case as compared to a disaster such as an earthquake or a tsunami? Why do you think that is?

3. The article mentions many ways in which *la roya* has a ripple effect, affecting individuals, families, communities, and entire nations far beyond coffee production. Which of these examples stood out to you most? Can you think of others?

4. As coffee-drinkers and as North Americans, do you feel we have a role to play in helping farmers combat coffee rust? For what reasons?

5. Was there a fact or image that stood out to you from the article that you might refer back to if you tell others about *la roya*?

6. Did you find any kernels of hope in this mostly bleak article?
